ou don't need a green thumb to know that we live in an area of microclimates, but observant local gardeners will you tell that sub-microclimates may exist on any single plot of land. Microclimates vary from eastern Lafayette to western Orinda, Canyon to southwestern Moraga, so when deciding what vegetables and fruit trees will grow well on your prop-

erty, the devil is in the details.

Serious gardeners keep a record of what happens year after year, observing the sun, wind and hardscape, and sometimes even installing small weather stations to capture data in different parts of their gardens.

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
