Despite the fact that the suspect was identified and had not been seen at Acalanes that day, police searched the campus and set up a perimeter at the suspect's home, while waiting for additional personnel. Thankfully, as police prepared to enter the home, a message from the suspect was received at the school, explaining premises, although several computers were seized and will be examined.

Police Ask Parents to Monitor Their Kids' Social Media Sites

Noting the recent incident involving threats on a social media site directed at Acalanes High School students, the June 2014 City of Lafayette Police Department Crime Bulletin offered the following advice to help prevent potentially tragic events from

"This incident highlights the need for parents to have access to the electronic devices and social media sites used by their children. Parents should know all of the access codes and passwords used by their children. Parents should randomly check those devices to see what their children are posting and what internet sites they visit. When children encounter a social media posting that concerns them, they need to say something to someone. Too many times tragic events are accompanied by individuals who knew there was something wrong, but failed to take any action."
