

trucks, motor graders, compactors, skip loaders, back hoes, water trucks, 10-wheel dump trucks and asphalt cold milling machines. This is not a slurry seal project; it is the full removal and reconstruction of major sections of the trail pavement.

Reconstruction of the pathway will start in Lafayette, near Topper Lane, and move toward Moraga. Cunning says the first two sections "are mandated to be finished before school starts," because both Stanley Middle School and Lafayette Elementary are near the affected pathway. "After that," he says, "there is no definite [repair] order." Meanwhile, Cunning encourages trail users to explore other trails, including the 33-mile long Iron Horse Trail, aga Trail is complete.
